Purpose

- A forum for advancing policies and collaborative initiatives to accelerate the cost-effective transition to the integrated use of hydrogen and fuel cell (HFCs) in the economy; and,
- A mechanism to **share information** and facilitate international research, demonstration and deployment activities related to HFC.

Policy context:

Key drivers of (1) energy security, (2) energy efficiency,

(3) economic growth and (4) environmental performance underlie the analysis and policy discussions.

Priorities

- 1. Highlight policy and regulatory actions to support widespread deployment in the energy and transportation systems;
- Accelerate market penetration and early adoption of HFC technologies and their supporting infrastructure;
- 3. Raise the profile of the current and potential opportunities with HFCs with policy-makers and the public; and,
- 4. Monitor hydrogen, fuel cell and complementary technology developments and inform members in support of action.

Near-Term Goals

- Foster momentum to view and consider HFCs as a component of the policy response to key national and international challenges – especially as a result of decisions at COP21.
- 2. Facilitate collaborative analysis across member countries and beyond to look at policy and regulatory issues that are barriers to, or opportunities for, the use of HFCs.
- 3. Encourage broader engagement and information sharing on the current status and potential of HFCs with policy developers and decision-makers, and, inform stakeholders not necessarily traditionally engaged on HFC issues.
